

On Wednesday, May 18, TAA welcomed Tiago Finato as our guest oil portrait demonstrator.

Members of the audience interested in becoming Tiago's live model participated in a raffle and Lionel Morris was the winner.

Lionel was seated on a raised platform 8 feet away and Tiago's recommendation is to have the model no further than 10 feet away. Tiago's palette was limited in order to be efficient. He prefers hog hair filbert brushes and Old Holland paints and used Liquin as a medium to help move the paint.

Tiago's canvas had previously been painted with 3 coats of gesso (sanded after each application) and toned with Burnt Umber. He normally begins a portrait with a pencil sketch on the canvas but in the interest of time he sketched with his brush. The lesson for the audience was to stress the idea of understanding what you are doing and to know what the painting will be like in the end; make sure you have a concept.

Once Tiago figured where things were he proceeded to loosely paint in the overall shape of Lionel's head with Raw Umber. The first 20 minutes with a live model are the most important; once the model moves from the original position it's hard to replicate the pose and the position of the light. He established the dark and light sides of the head, put a few strokes in for the neck and shoulder area and placed the location of the nose. From there he figured the jaw line and eye sockets. He didn't worry about

the details at this point nor the likeness to the model because the painting was constantly changing as he painted. Any mistakes can easily be removed with a paper towel. More attention was given to the light side and the dark areas had less detail. He added darker values to the negative space in the background and said it is okay to use black instead of wasting time mixing your own. The background is there only to show the foreground.

After a brief break Tiago had to rely on his initial drawing. The model was only a reference at this point and he suggested that you trust your eye to see what you should paint with a live model; don't measure. When painting from a picture, however, measuring is a must. He continued to add form to the background and shoulder area then lightened the areas in the face. He used bright colors in a series of loose strokes of color rather than blend. The color stays pure that way and it gives the painting a scuptural look. The neck stayed cooler so it would recede. Constantly think about what the finished portrait will look like and keep comparing the placement of the eyes, nose and mouth without worrying about the details. Work big to small. You'll know you are done when the value transitions, textures, lines and small areas are there.

Tiago said, "Nothing is good enough in my paintings. I'm always trying to learn. Just paint! Don't be so critical. Enjoy each painting and keep them all. You'll learn as you go. After several years, you'll look back on them and see that you did learn. You need the record".
