# Karen Callan



TAA's own Karen Callan will be having a solo exhibit entitled "Window Treatments" in the Community Gallery at the Attleboro Arts Museum for the month of October.

These photos are a part of an ongoing series of images captured through and on windows. The series

combines a couple of interests of hers: architectural elements and reflective surfaces. Karen is intrigued by how objects in front of her in the interior merge with objects behind her that are reflected in the window glass, which serves as a canvas for new and unique images.

All images were created with a Nikon D50 camera with minimal editing in Photoshop and were printed in a professional photo lab on archival paper.

Karen will also be a part of a landscape photo exhibit called "Hues of Light: Expressions in Landscape Photography". The show will run Sept. 30 - Oct. 31 at the Cranston Public Library, Cranston, RI.






### Mike Lynn workshop

On Saturday, October 17, from 9 am - 3 pm, TAA's own Mike Lynn will be teaching an oil portait workshop. Mike received professional training in drawing and painting at the Lee Smith Art Studio in Middleboro, MA. He has attended many art demonstrations and workshops with notable artsits such as Helen Von Wyck and David A. Leffel.

For the past 20 years, Mike has attended many life drawing classes and has used numerous art magazines, books, and visits to art museums and galleries to improve his work. He teaches oil painting



classes at his home studio in Middleboro as well at TAA.

The key components for a successful artist, Mike says, are the ability to draw well, the elements of design, knowing your palette, how to mix color, and brush control.



On Wednesday, Sept. 16, TAA hosted a demo by Carolyn Letvin. An oil painter by practice, Carolyn showed us how plein air artists can become their own printmakers.

First of all Carolyn's monotype (meaning 1 print) was done with a monotone color that she made from a mix of Dioxazine Purple, Deep Cadmium Red, Paynes

Gray, Raw Umber, and Sap Green. Added to the mix was Galkyd slow drying medium. Her painting surface was a piece of plexiglass and she used soft bristle brushes that she's had for years.

Carolyn started the process by placing the plexiglass over a rough sketch from a photo. She then used a rubber brayer to apply a thin coat of paint over the plexiglass. With a brush she then placed in her dark areas and worked toward her light areas. Dark areas can be smoothed with the brayer if there is too much build-up. Light areas can be pushed around or wiped out with a clean brush. She also mentioned that you could use Q-tips or paper towels. When she got to the grass she used a rubber wipe-out tool and her fingernail.

Once the painting was complete Carolyn placed it on a larger sheet of plexiglass which had a sheet of acetate taped to it. She took a sheet of Arches BFK Rives printing paper and wet it in a tub of water. She let the excess water drip off then placed the paper over the painting then the acetate over the paper. She then applied firm, even pressure over the acetate with a tool called Sasha's Palm Press, making sure all of the surface area of her painting was covered. You could use a wooden spoon for this process, too, but she doesn't suggest anything as large as a rolling pin because you can't generate enough pressure. Once she felt the process was complete, she lifted the acetate off and peeled the paper off of the plexiglass. The result is the picture you see at the bottom left. Way cool! Please note that the prints are the reverse of the painting.

The picture on the bottom right is a monotype done by a collaboration of some members in the audience. This was a very different process and we were amazed that oil and water worked together so well. Carolyn said it all had to do with the chemical reaction of the paper, water, and oil. But, she said, you can't add any more paint to your paper print but you can if the monotype technique is on a gessoed canvas.
